## THE ANATOMY OF A BATHROOM REMODEL

## THE PLANNING

Removing the window allowed for a larger vanity and a cabinet for storage without sacrificing any of the natural light that was greatly desired. We replaced the built-in tub with a freestanding one that opened up the bathroom and made it more spacious. This gave room for a larger shower footprint, finished with floor-to-ceiling glass panels to keep the openness and allow the tile accents to be seen.



## THEDESIGN

The inspiration for this bathroom came from the lilac marble mosaic seen on the vanity wall. This acted as the ground for the surrounding tile selections, the Bianco Dolomiti floor tiles and herringbone shower walls. The shower floor and ceiling are outfitted with lilac narrow herringbone tile as a subtle nod to the feature wall. The natural tones from the cerused oak vanity added to the spa-like feel of this primary bath. Light lavender vinyl wallcovering and floral window treatments finished the space.

DESIGN TIP: Lighting can be jewelry for any room. We selected this bubble chandelier to act as an interesting centerpiece to tie the room together.
